## Receives National "Schools to Watch" Recognition

Highlands School District is proud to announce that Highlands Middle School, the district's Grades 6, 7 and 8 building, is now a recognized Pennsylvania Don Eichhorn "Schools to Watch" Program school. This prestigious recognition only includes 35 other schools in Pennsylvania and only 400 nationwide in the Schools to Watch program, an initiative of the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform.

As a School to Watch, it will be a model school that schools throughout the state will visit to experience first-hand what a high performing middle grade school is like while working on its trajectory towards success. Each school selected to be a Schools to Watch school is

unique in appearance, population a technique, but according to Bruce Vosburgh, the Director of the PA program, "Each is a place that's special, and a place that any of us would LOVE for our children or grandchildren to attend!"

Highlands Middle School principals Mr. Charlie Mort and Ms. Debbie Beucker worked diligently with Superintendent Dr. Michael Bjalobok, the School Board of Directors, faculty, staff, parents and students during this three-year process in transitioning the Middle School to a true middle grades program. The school will be officially awarded in February.

"This is a significant step to the future of the Middle School and a prestigious award," Dr. Bjalobok said. "It has been a progressive project that we are very proud of the Middle School administration and staff for accomplishing in order to bring Highlands Middle School back to a true middle school model. We are also grateful for the support from the School Board, parents and community in helping to achieve the designation."

PA Don Eichhorn Schools: "Schools to Watch" (PA STW) is part of a recognition program developed by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform. In partnership with the Pennsylvania Department of Education, the Pennsylvania Association for Middle Level Education, Duquesne University, Edinboro University, Shippensburg University, Horace Mann Service Corporation, and

Vibra Life, the Pennsylvania "Schools to Watch" team announced that Highlands Middle School has met the strict STW criteria, joining 28 other Pennsylvania middle-grades schools recognized previously. The six newest schools as well as the six re-designated schools will be recognized at the Pennsylvania Association for Middle Level Education State Conference at the Penn Stater Conference Center in State College on February 28.

State leaders selected each school for its academic excellence, its responsiveness to the needs and interests of young adolescents, and its commitment to helping all students achieve at high levels. In addition, each school

has strong leadership, teachers who work together to

improve curriculum and instruction, and a commitment to assessment and accountability to bring about continuous

improvement. Dr. Irv Howard, Past President of the National Forum stated, "We congratulate these schools for being places that do great things for all of their students. These schools demonstrate that high-performing middle grades schools are places that focus on academic growth and achievement. They are also that recognize places importance of meeting the needs of all of their students and ensure that every child has access to a rigorous.

high-quality education."

Linda Hopping, Chair, as well as other members of the National Forum Schools to Watch Oversight Committee, explain that selection was based on a written application that required schools to show how they met criteria developed by the National Forum. Schools that appeared to meet the criteria were then visited by state teams, which observed classrooms, interviewed administrators, teachers, students, and parents, and looked at achievement data, suspension rates, quality of lessons, and student work. Schools are recognized for a three-year period, and at the end of three years, they must demonstrate progress on specific goals in order to be re-designated. Unlike the Blue Ribbon recognition program, "Schools to Watch" requires schools to not just identify strengths, but to also focus on areas for

continuous improvement; thus the three year re-designation.

"We are pleased that our Schools to Watch program has shown that schools can meet high academic expectations while preserving a commitment of healthy development and equity for all students," said Ericka Uskali, National Forum Executive Director. "These Schools to Watch are indeed special; they make education so exciting that students and teachers don't want to miss a day. These schools have proven that it is possible to overcome barriers to achieving excellence, and any middle-level school in any state can truly learn from their examples," Uskali said.

#### **About "Schools to Watch"**

Launched in 1999, Schools to Watch began as a national program to identify middle-grades schools across the country that were meeting or exceeding 37 researched based criteria developed by the National Forum. The Forum developed a website *http://middlegradesforum.org* that features online tours of schools, as well as detailed information about the selection criteria used in the recognition program. There are now 17 states across the country, which have trained Schools to Watch State Teams, with more than 4000 schools recognized across the country.

The National Forum sponsors the Schools to Watch program along with the Association for Middle Level Education, the National Association for Elementary School Principals, the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Learning Forward, ASCD, and State Schools to Watch affiliates.

## Beucker Named PAESSP Outstanding Principal



Highlands School District is proud to announce that **Debbie Beucker**, assistant principal at Highlands Middle School, has been named *Pennsylvania Association of Elementary and Secondary School Principals'* (PAESSP) 2015 Outstanding Assistant Principal.

Ms. Beucker has been an educator for 21 years and an assistant principal for 12 years. In her career, she has been a librarian and English teacher in Boca Raton, FL; a librarian in Franklin Regional High School in Murrysville, PA, and an assistant principal at Highlands High School.

Ms. Beucker also heads the HMS Data Team, which helps to monitor and track student academic growth on state and local assessments. She works closely with faculty, students and family with the Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) model, which has helped students to model expected behaviors and, she believes, has helped her to reduce discipline by 50 percent.

The award is distributed by the Pennsylvania Association of Elementary and Secondary School Principals in association with the National Association of Elementary School Principals (NAESP) and VOYA Financial.

Ms. Beucker hopes to leave a legacy of "lifelong learners" at HMS. "Students at HMS will become adults who KNOW that they have a future and that they are capable of realizing it. 
#### **INUIT CULTURE DAY**

#### **Junior Apprentice Advantage (JAA) Program**

#### The Right Choice for a "Gold-Collar Career" in Advanced Manufacturing







Highlands High School is proud to partner with Oberg Industries through the Junior Apprentice Advantage (JAA) program, an educational initiative offered to seniors at Highlands High School. This program between Oberg Industries and Highlands School District offers students a head start to learning the technological skills required to pursue a career in the challenging and lucrative advanced manufacturing industry. Currently, 11 High School seniors are enrolled in the program and four recent graduates are employed at Oberg.

Students who exhibit select aptitudes and continue to demonstrate proficiency in the JAA curriculum work towards placement in Oberg Industries' state-certified Apprenticeship Program. This curriculum consists of Computer Aided Design (CAD), Geometric Tolerance and Dimensioning, Measurement Science (Metrology), Advanced Geometry/Trigonometry, and Academic English 12. With the help of high school teachers Mr. Michael Santucci, Mr. Matthew Sespico, Mr. John Malobicky and Mr. Dan Krynicki, students take the four courses at school, work with the online learning application "ToolingU" on school-issued iPads and travel twice per month to Oberg to gain first-hand experiences with precision manufacturing tools. This Fall, Highlands received a donation of computer desks, chairs and other furniture from Allison Park Industrial Complex and several pieces of metrology equipment from Oberg for the JAA program.

"The instruction that they are getting from seasoned veterans and the monetary investment provided by the company is like nothing I've ever seen," Mr. Sespico said. Students who complete the JAA program courses in good academic standing and satisfy Oberg's apprenticeship entrance requirements will be offered preferred placement as full-time apprentices at Oberg Industries upon graduation from high school. In addition, if the student is

selected and completes Oberg's apprenticeship program, each candidate will receive a college certificate and credits from Butler County Community College that can be applied to a degree.

"This is an exciting opportunity for our students to learn hands-on, develop a plan for their futures, and contribute to a global market right in their hometown community," said **Dr. Michael Bjalobok**, Superintendent of Highlands School District.

More than 500 yearly job openings are projected for highly skilled precision manufacturing workers over the next decade. **Alex Telford**, a graduate of the first JAA class and current Oberg apprentice, commented, "The JAA classes, especially advanced math, gave me a head start to begin working for Oberg as an apprentice machinist. My senior year was the best because I had a clear focus to achieve an attainable goal while still in high school."

#### **Highlands Moves Forward with New District Goals**

President John F. Kennedy once said, "Change is the Law of Life. And those who look only to the past or the present are sure to miss the future." Highlands administration, teachers, staff and students are looking to the future with the expansion of school programs, pursuit of professional and student developments and preparation for the use of new, advanced technology that will prepare our students for successful academic careers and lives. Listed below are the Highlands School District Goals. At Highlands, we aim to move the Home, School and Community into the future! Please take a moment to review the district goals, and as always, we welcome your feedback and suggestions.

#### 1. Student Achievement

At Highlands, the student and student achievement is at the center of everything that we do. Offering universal screenings provides us with the information that we need to offer tiered instruction and interventions to the students as individuals. Ongoing data collection and progress monitoring and the use of research-based and evidenced-based instructional and intervention curriculums, resources, and tools allow us to help our students to achieve to their greatest potential. Some of the key components helping us to meet our goals are:

NorthWest Evaluation Associates (NWEA) and Measure of Academic Progress (MAP): Web-based assessment that is administered three times per year. Based on a true growth model, this assessment gives accurate data to drive instruction.

**Compass Learning Odyssey:** Live data from MAP is downloaded to create and individual learning path for each student. Elementary and Middle School students access Odyssey to be enriched or remediated at their true ability level. In the Secondary, Compass Learning is more of a course that can be used for credit recovery.

**Dibels** is a measure of reading fluency utilized in the elementary to guide instruction. **Ed Insight** is a curriculum mapping software utilized to provide updates to the District curriculum.

#### 2. Safe and Welcoming Learning Environment

Highlands School District is committed to providing a safe and welcoming environment for our students, our staff, our parents and families, and for our community stakeholders. Through ongoing planning and our safety measures, we continue to be cutting edge when it comes to keeping our students safe.

#### Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support (PBIS):

PBIS is endorsed by the PA Department of Education as a highly effective strategy to help the struggling learner. Highlands has fully embraced this concept.

Respectful, Accountable, Motivated and Safe (RAMS): Allows all stakeholders to learn and practice these tenets each and every day. In addition, our Anti-Bully program for K-12 ("Second Step") frames learning to acknowledge and accept diversity and differences.

*Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate (ALICE)* training for all building K-12 for the active intruder.

#### 3. Dynamic Curriculum

Curriculum Teams are formed in the specific content areas K-12. Curriculum mapping and gap analysis occurs. Content specialists from the Allegheny Intermediate Unit will be utilized to guide this ongoing process. Math Curriculum will be completed in the 2015-16 school year. These curriculums will be living documents, allowing teachers and staff to access, to utilize, and to update as needed for our student population. Skills sets should be developed that allow for our students to be successful citizens in their post-high school experiences.

#### 4. Professional Development

"One size fits all" is not an effective means to educate and enrich the faculty. We need to meet the individual needs of the staff just as we do with students. Working within a *Multi-Tiered System of Support* allows our staff to experience and develop skills that will help the effectiveness of their teaching and will foster a culture of learning for all of our students. Professional Development in the 2015-16 school year is differentiated and driven to advance the growth of the teaching staff. Highlands utilizes consultants for staff professional development. *Dr. Mitch Nichols* works with the High School staff to address the transition from 8th to 9th grade, focusing primarily on the freshman class. *Mr. Rich TenEyck* is consultant for professional development who works primarily with the administrative team. Mr. TenEyck is a former Department Secretary of Education in New Jersey.

#### 5. Teaching and Learning

The PA Department of Education has provided a new evaluation for teachers. Our goal is to ensure that the teaching staff and administration work collaboratively and utilize the new tool effectively. **Student Learning Outcomes (SLO)** training will be provided and time will be given to accomplish this task. The **Educator Effectiveness Model** will be implemented and support will be provided to the teachers as the new evaluation is implemented.

#### 6. Technology Integration

The Highlands Virtual Academy/Technology Committee will focus on a 1 to 1 initiative for Highlands High School that will be implemented in the 2016-17 school year. The goal is to transform instruction and define what a device can do for instruction before it is purchased. There will be a focus on hybrid learning, which is a combination of on-line and traditional course offerings. The district will be working toward implementing a new student data management system for our staff to utilize as well. Highlands uses the Apple Leadership Team and Questeq in the development and exploration of a 1 to 1 initiative in the High School. Students also are incorporated into this development.

#### 7. Collaborative Culture

The culture of the Highlands School District must be built on cooperation and collaboration. These two essential elements build trust in the school district for all stakeholders. Additionally, the administrative team and all teachers in the **New Teacher Induction Program** receive **Diversity Training**.

## **Salvation Army Partners with HSD for Kids**

The Allegheny Valley Salvation Army in Brackenridge for a number of years has assisted Highlands School District families by providing weekly programming, weekend food, annual school supply and services giveaways, winter clothing and other holiday-time support. This year, Capt. Rickie Armour and his wife, Pam, have continued the "Love in a Backpack" program to provide 60 students at Highlands Middle School and Grandview Upper Elementary School with easy to prepare food items for the weekend, as well as take 20 students shopping with the Pittsburgh Penguins for winter gear in the "Project Bundle-Up" event in November.

"Love in a Backpack" started three years ago at Highlands Middle School as a pilot program based off of the nationally modeled Blessings in a Backpack program. The program supports students throughout the school year by providing snack foods, easy to prepare foods, boxed or bagged beverages and other items that will sustain them through the weekend when they

don't receive breakfast and lunch at school. The program assists students through the year or temporarily, if a family has a short-term need due to financial hardship.

Members of the Board of the Salvation Army of Allegheny County notified the Armours of the Blessings in a Backpack program and they believed it could benefit the Highlands School District families. Through discussion, Highlands Middle School was selected to pilot the program in hopes that HMS students could learn RESPONSIBILITY for their involvement in receiving and returning the backpacks; COMPASSION by sharing with siblings in the home who also may be hungry; and could observe a community in ACTION to help each other as they are being helped. The program continued at the Middle School as well as extended to Grandview last year.


"We aim to reduce hunger in a child and create some kind of food security in a child's home," Capt. Armour said. In addition, such programs have been proved to improve a student's health and nutrition, test scores, attendance, social skills, personality growth and development and create a deeper connection

between home and school.

"It's getting pretty expensive, and we're not getting the amount of donations we were before," said Capt. Armour. "We're extremely grateful for these donations. They really keep us going."

Capt. Armour said it costs about \$5 to feed one child for a weekend. Some parents have donated the money that they would have paid for their students' school food to the backpack program since the schools now benefit from a free food federal program. Several community organizations, such as the Natrona Catholic Daughters of America group, have also collected food donations for the program. Anyone who would like to donate to the program can leave donations at the Salvation Army, 917 Brackenridge Avenue in Brackenridge or call 724-224-6310.

In addition to the weekend food program, the Salvation Army provided more than 350 free backpacks stuffed with school supplies at its annual Back to School Bash in August, which also hosted several service providers for students to have their vision checked, receive haircuts and meet local emergency service providers. Capt. Armour also treated 20 students from Grandview Upper Elementary School to a shopping trip at Dick's Sporting Goods in Cranberry Township to meet some of the Pittsburgh Penguins and shop for coats, boots and other winter necessities. During the school year, the Salvation Army also provides homework help and other faith-based programming for after-school activities and involvement.

**Grandview Celebrates** 

1950s

Many Tarentum High School, Highlands Junior High School and Grandview Elementary alumni, staff, student, former Highlands educators and community members gathered at Grandview Upper Elementary on Saturday, August 29, 2015 to celebrate the Grandview building's 100th year as a school and reminisce about the "good old days".

Hosted by the Tarentum Recreation Board, former Highlands School Board President Carrie Fox, Grandview Principal Heather Bigney, Highlands staff and the Allegheny-Valley Historical Society, the event featured building tours, memorabilia, entertainment from the Highlands Alumni Choir and Middle School Choir, and free shuttles to the Historic Society Heritage Museum.

One of the highlights of the event was being able to go on the vast, flat roof of the building for a different vantage point of the Tarentum community and bridge. The roof tour also offered a close up view of the ornate gargoyles that adorn the Grandview facade.

Grandview school was designed by Press Dowler, and built in 1915 as an elementary school. It served as Tarentum High School from 1927-1968; Highlands Junior High School from 1969-1982; Grandview

Elementary from 1982-2012; and Grandview Upper Elementary from 2012-present, housing grades 3-5. "I will always remember how Grandview and the community are so entwined...we all worked together to make Grandview a wonderful place to learn and grow," said retired Highlands teacher **Debbie (Dobrzynski) Cordera**.

#### **Schools Receive Grants for Supplies**

Grandview Upper Elementary School and Fawn Primary Center received \$10,000 each in school and classroom supplies from The Education Partnership in Pittsburgh. These schools are two of three schools that attended a Special Distribution Event in November to pick up items from Mead, Yoobi and other brands, with items for teachers, organizing classrooms and everyday needs such as wipes, dusting cloths and post-its.

"The Education Partnership understands that the State Budget Impasse has compounded the need for school supplies in many schools in our service area," a representative from the Partnership said. "We will be working diligently in the coming months to raise funds with the hope of bringing on additional schools."

### Highlands Implements ALICE Defense Program



Highlands School District places school security at the top of its priority list. The administration team regularly reviews security procedures, potential improvements and available programs that could enhance or support the current security program already in place in our district's schools.

This year, Highlands staff have been trained in the ALICE defense program and students will experience ALICE training drills during the school day. The Alert, Lockdown, Information, Counter and Evacuation program is a crisis training program being introduced this year to give staff and students insight and response options when encountering an active shooter.

Highlands School District places the safety and security of our buildings at a top priority. Through the years, we have installed metal detectors, vestibules at the entrances, Raptor scanning software for visitors, shatterproof glass film on windows, more than 200 security cameras and large screen monitors in offices, staff identification, radio systems, numbered doors and windows for police identification, additional security personnel and a school resource officer in efforts to secure our campuses. The district also received exceptional reports from a Pennsylvania State Police security audit. The ALICE training is yet another program that will enable our staff and students in the situation that an intruder is announced.

"This training allows us to make students and staff aware that active shooter or violent intruder situations are, unfortunately, very real and serious possibilities," security director and ALICE certified instructor **Mr. Jay Morgan** stated at an initial training held for school personnel at the beginning of the school year. Since that district-wide training, teachers and staff received additional instruction, training exercises and guidance on age-specific conversation regarding ALICE drills in order to communicate with their students.

The ALICE program was created by two Texas law enforcement officers soon after the Columbine High School shootings occurred in Colorado. The training has since been adopted by many educational law enforcement institutions throughout the United States. The Columbine staff reacted to the 1999 shooting, which left 12 students and one teacher dead, in accordance to the training they had received – a typical lockdown, duck-and-cover method – despite having access to an outside exit. Proponents of ALICE, after studying many of the active school shootings since Columbine, believe their program can reduce the number of victims.

"Are we prepared when today is different than yesterday?" Mr. Morgan said. "Are our protocols, training, knowledge bases updated to best protect our schools now?" Mr. Morgan presented the break-down of the ALICE

training to parents at the district schools during Back to School Night and Parent-Teacher Conference events prior to the ALICE drills being conducted at each school in November and December.

**Alert -** Immediately let as many people as possible know about the danger, using any method to communicate such as phones, texts and social media.

**Lockdown** classrooms - Doors are locked and barricaded and students are trained to get low and pull things, such as a desk, between them and the classroom door.

Inform - Relay information within the school building on the whereabouts of the active shooter, using school radios and public address systems can alert others in the building where the shooter is. This could provide an opportunity to move students out of the school toward safety.

**Counter -** This means a teacher or student should use any means necessary to create distance from the shooter and also distract a shooter. It also means to use any means necessary to defend oneself.

**Evacuate** any way possible - Understanding when and where to evacuate a building is important. Staff and students also need to know where safe rally points outside the building are located.

Trainings will be presented in age-appropriate ways at each school building, with teachers communicating the program along with safety personnel and school resource officers, if on-site. Guidance counselors also are available for students to discuss concerns with, and parents / guardians are able to opt their students out of the ALICE drill, if necessary.

The ALICE training, drills, handbooks and other materials have been shared with the four police departments in the school district. Several police officers attended the initial school personnel training and parent presentations. Sergeant **Brian Turack** of the Harrison Township Police Department concurred with Mr. Morgan that the best plan is to have a plan. "One of the best things we know is to develop an emergency response plan. I'm glad Highlands is taking initiative to prepare for an incident such as this – we want to be involved with the school in being prepared."
